## The Ahmadiyya Community

he Ahmadiyya Movement in Islam is a religious organization, international in its scope, with branches in over 175 countries in Africa, North America, South America, Asia, Australasia, and Europe. At present, its total membership exceeds 200 million worldwide, and the numbers are increasing daily. This is the most dynamic denomination of Islam in modern history.

The Ahmadiyya Movement was established in 1889 by Hadhrat Mirza Ghulam Ahmad (1835-1908) was born in a small and remote village, Qadian, in the Punjab, India. He claimed to be the expected reformer of the latter days, the Awaited One of the world community of religions (The Mahdi and Messiah). The Movement he started is

is Holiness Hazrat Mirza Masroor Ahmad, Khalifatul-Masih V, was born on September 15th, 1950 in Rabwah, Pakistan to Hadhrat Sahibzada Mirza Mansoor Ahmad and Hadhrat Sahibzadi Nasira Begam Sahiba.

He is the great grandson of The Promised Messiah a.s., grandson of Hadhrat Mirza Sharif Ahmad r.a, and maternal grandson of Hadhrat Khalifatul Masih II r.a.

In 1976 he earned his Masters of Science degree in Agricultural Economics from the Agriculture University Faisalabad, Pakistan.

In 1977 he devoted his life (Waqfe Zindagi) for the service of Islam and went to Ghana under the Nusrat-Jahan Scheme, which supports a large number of hospitals and schools in West Africa.

From 1977 to 1985 in Ghana, he was the Principal of Ahmadiyya Secondary School Sagala for 2 year, Principal of Ahmadiyya Secondary School Easarcher for 4 years, and was Manager of Ahmadiyya Agricultural Farm

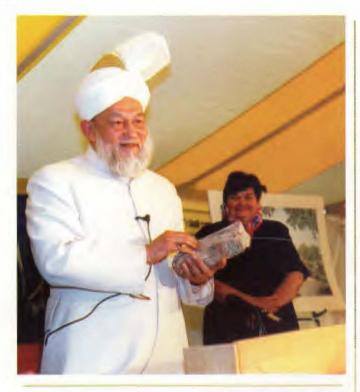

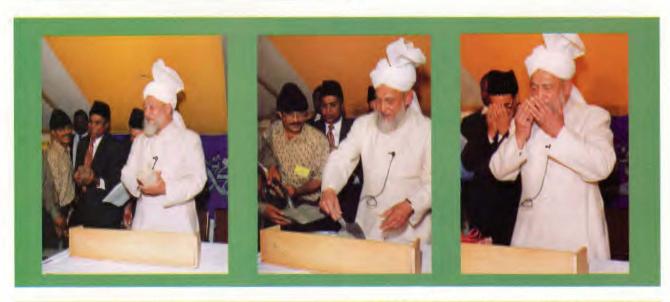

## **Groundbreaking Ceremony**

A groundbreaking ceremony was held in November, 2000 by members of the Ahmadiyya Muslim Community, Chicago. The ceremony was led by President Falahud-Din Shams and Regional Missionary Mubasher Ahmad, who led everyone in collective silent prayers for the successful completion of the new mosque.



## A Muslim missionary in America

r. Mufti Muhammad Sadiq, who came from India, was the first Muslim Missionary to America. His purpose, as a representative of the Ahmadiyya Movement In Islam, was to convert Americans to the religion of Islam.

On January 24, 1920, Dr. Sadiq left England on the S.S. Haverford, headed for the United States, where he intended to establish a mission. On board the ship Dr. Sadiq succeeded in converting six Chinese passengers to the Ahmadiyya Muslim faith.

When the S.S. Haverford arrived in Philadelphia on February 15, 1920, the United States Immigration authorities refused to allow Dr. Sadiq to enter the country. After the authorities had interrogated him for several hours and had established that Dr. Sadiq was a

representative of a religious group that practiced polygamy, they asked him to leave the United States. Dr. Sadiq refused to go and asked for an appeal to the Secretariat in Washington, D.C. He was confined to the Philadelphia Detention House until the decision of the appeal was reversed.

Mr. R. 1. Rochford, who was also in the Detention House, became Dr. Sadiq's first convert to Islam in the United States. During those weeks of confinement, Dr. Sadiq made nineteen other converts. These men were from Jamaica, British Guiana, Poland, Russia, Germany, Azores, Belgium, Portugal, Italy, and France.

After seven weeks of confinement, Dr. Sadiq was finally allowed to enter the United States in April of 1920. In October, 1920, Dr. Sadiq moved the headquarters of the Ahmadiyya mission to Chicago because of its central location. He purchased a house in an affluent area of Chicago, at 4448 S. Wabash, and converted it to a mosque. In July 1921, he published the first issue of the *Moslem Sunrise*. When Dr. Sadiq began his missionary work in the United States, most Americans had never heard of Islam or the name "Muslim," and had never seen a mosque. Today, Islam is the fastest growing religion in the United States, with millions of converts to various sects.

The Ahmadiyya Movement In Islam is continuing its missionary efforts across the United States and around the world. It has established missions in 175 countries. It has chapters in more than 50 U.S. cities, where new mosques and mission houses have been established. Dr. Sadiq's work has grown from one small seed of faith into a tree whose branches are spreading from coast to coast.

## The purpose of a mosque

uslims make use of mosques for purposes of congregational prayers but this is not due to any feeling that the sites of buildings of these mosques possess any peculiar sanctity for the purposes of divine worship.

A mosque is built to enable the Muslims of the neighborhood to assemble for the purpose of congregational prayers. Mosques facilitate the performance of collective worship and are used for other religious and social purposes also. No particular



ceremony is required for consecrating mosques and dedicating them to the worship of God, as is the case with temples and churches. Any building that is used for the purpose of congregational prayers by the Muslims is a mosque.

No structural design has been prescribed for a mosque nor is a mosque divided into naves and transepts, nor does it possess anything resembling an altar. There are no pictures or images in a mosque nor relics of saints. The Muslims gather for divine worship in the simplest possible manner and Islamic religious services are free from all artistic and emotional distractions.

There is no music or singing, no temples dances, no priestly vestments, no burning of candles and no attempt to create an emotional atmosphere by the aid of organs or incense. The light inside a mosque is not dimmed artificially to create an

atmosphere of awe and no images of saints divert the attention of worshippers from God. At the appointed hour the worshippers collect in the mosque and range themselves in rows to indicate that, having concluded their individual worship in their homes or in the mosque, they are now ready to offer collective worship to God.

Mosques are used not solely for the purposes of congregational and individual worship but for all kinds of religious and intellectual pursuits. They serve as schools and for the celebration of marriages, as courts of law and places of meeting where plans are settled for the social and economic progress of the community.

## The importance of mosques

asjid is an Arabic word, which means a place where prostration is done before Allah Ta'ala (God Almighty) for His worship. The word Masjid (mosque) has been used many times in the holy Qur'an to convey these meanings.

A Mosque plays a pivotal role in Islam. It serves as a center for worship and the remembrance of Allah and is a center for learning and training for practical living. It is indeed an institution for the development of religious, spiritual and moral qualities of Muslims and provides knowledge and guidance for the welfare and betterment.

A mosque very effectively facilitates and promotes equality, kindness towards one another and brotherly love. It creates discipline and serves as a vehicle to end disorder and disorganization among Muslims. It is a sacred and blessed place where there is no distinction between the rich and the poor, a king or a beggar. And every Mosque that is built for the worship and remembrance of God Almighty becomes instrumental in the promotion of higher moral qualities among Muslims.

Any person who takes part in the construction and maintenance of a Mosque built to promote goodness and welfare of Muslims is given the following good news from the Holy Prophet: 'One who builds or participates in building Allah's House (a Mosque) in this world seeking only His pleasure, Allah builds a house for him in paradise.'

A Mosque is an effective means for the propagation and progress of Islam. Experience tells us that non-Muslims are deeply impressed when they see out Mosques and observe the manner of our worship in them. Syed Ammer Ali, a well know Muslim scholar referring to an English historian in his book, Tanqeedul Islam (Criticism of Islam) writes: "It is one of the superiorities of Islam that Muslims can worship any place on this Earth." (So whichever way you turn, there will be the face of Allah. (AI-Baqarah, 2:116).

Any place becomes sacred and can be considered a Mosque where you worship Allah. Whether at home or on a journey, a Muslim will pour his heart out before his Creator through simple but exciting expression when the prayer time approaches. His heart is satisfied in the short prayer service and whatever he recites during prayer expresses the Glory, the Mercy and the Blessings of Allah and his humility and dependence upon Him. A Christian cannot even imagine the pleasure of worship enjoyed in Islamic prayer.' (Faslul Khitab, 2nd Ed., Part 2, page 117)

## **History of Baetul Jamaay**

■February 1984: A five-acre parcel of land in Glen Ellyn, Illinois was purchased. A 90-year-old single family home was used by the Jama'at until construction began on the new mosque.



- ■1988: With the support and encouragement of the Late M. M. Ahmad Sahib, Amir Jama'at USA, President Falahuddin Shams Sahib and Property Secretary Ashfaq Ahmad started the process of getting the footwork done to build a mosque on the above parcel of land. Robert Gildo, attorneyat-law, was hired to represent the Jama'at in zoning matters pertaining to the mosque construction.
- ■1989: In order to submit our application for a zoning change, surveys were prepared, title documents obtained, site plans developed, along with building drawings, etc. These plans were submitted to the County at the end of the year to obtain the proper zoning for construction of a mosque.
- ■1990: A public hearing was scheduled by the County of Dupage. According to country officials more than 400 persons made telephone calls, sent faxes, and letters expressing their concern and opposition to the mosque project. The decision was made to withdraw the zoning permit request one day before the hearing because of heated opposition.
- ■1991-1992: Mosque plans were revised based on comments from area residents, concerned citizens and County officials.
- ■1993: The Jama'at devised a plan to involve area residents in an information session as part of its planning cycle. Residents living in the area of the planned mosque were invited to an informational breakfast meeting pertaining to the proposed mosque plans. In attendance there were more than

40 residents including the City of Glen Ellyn Planning and Development officials. The project engineer, James Zografoos, presented an overview of the project.

The residents were given assurances that their feedback would be incorporated into the mosque plans.

As a result of the meeting, the Jama'at obtained invaluable feedback and suggestions to improve the project. Over the course of the next few months, further changes were made to the plans based on the feedback obtained from the neighbors. The entrances and some building details were modified, landscaping enhanced, and privacy for the neighbors increased.

- Board of Appeals held a second public hearing on the mosque project. Engineer and Attorney, Falahuddin Shams Sahib, and Ashfaq Ahmad Sahib represented the Jama'at. In complete opposition to the first public hearing, there was not one objector to the proposed mosque project. The Pastor from St. Thomas Methodist Church, located directly across the street from the mosque site, was highly in favor of the project.
- ■1994: Dupage County Zoning Board of Appeals voted to recommend the granting of a zoning variance in a residential area for the construction of a mosque.
- ■1995: M. M. Ahmad Sahib, Ameer of the US Jama'at, who had been supportive of the mosque project from the beginning, informed the Jama'at

that construction of the Glen Ellyn Mosque would be put on hold due to limited funds. As a result, Chicago Jama'at applied for and was granted a zoning extension for the mosque project.

■1995-1996: Meetings and discussions were held with the architect and engineers to develop the conceptual design into a detailed design. After a thorough review, the completed design plans were approved by the Chicago Majlis-e-Amila.

In April, the plans were forwarded to the Ameer for approval and a formal presentation was made to the National Mosque Committee. There was discussion and questions were answered to the satisfaction of all concerned. The Ameer gave his complete approval to proceed with the proposed plans.

The plans were then submitted to Khalifatul-Masih IV, in London, for his review, comments, and approval. Abdul Rashid Sahib, an architect in London, was appointed by Hazoor to review the plans. After many long-distance discussions and faxes, concerns with the plans were resolved, as advised by Hazoor. A formal approval was received from Ameer Sahib on July 3, 1996.

- 1996-1997: Our engineers and architects developed detailed construction, electrical, plumbing, structural and site plans for the mosque. Upon completion, bids were obtained from approximately 10 contractors.
- June 17, 1997: By the Grace of God, the Ahmadiyya Movement, Chicago Chapter, held its foundation laying ceremony for the Glen Ellyn Mosque. Hazrat Mirza Tahir Ahmad, Khalifatul Masih the IV, ra, who blessed us with his presence, presided over the ceremony. It was a historic occasion. The bricks used by Hazoor were collected from the original mosque purchased in 1922 by Mufti Muhammad Sadiq, first missionary to the USA.

All members, young and old were present, including Ahmadi Muslims from Detroit, St. Louis, Milwaukee, Zion, and St. Paul. The Honorable Beverly Fawell, State Senator for Glen Ellyn, was the guest speaker. Other notables included Honorable Thomas J. Walsh, State Senator, 22nd

District of DuPage County. Following the speeches, Hazoor laid the foundation stone of the mosque, and led a collective silent prayer.

Hazoor presided over a mosque committee meeting in which the project architect, Mr. Scarlatis, briefed him on the design and plans. Hazoor provided specific instructions, which were later incorporated into the plans.

- ■1997-1998: The plans were revised, based on instructions from Hazoor. They were further simplified, and the building down-sized from 36,000 to a 21,000 square foot building. Based on the revised plans, ten contractors were invited to place bids. Eight contractors submitted bids, which were reviewed and analyzed. Recommendations were made to accept the bid from Buildco, Inc.
- ■August 1998: Upon approval of headquarters, a contract to construct the mosque with Buildco Inc. was signed.
- ■November 20, 2000: After four revisions, and many months of work with DuPage County and the Illinois Department of Transportation, the building and site plans were approved for permit issuance.
- ■January 18, 2001: Building permits were issued by DuPage County Building Department.
- ■March 11, 2001: Due to excessive additional costs, a new construction contract was signed and executed with AKMA Construction Company and All Chicago, Inc. (a joint venture) to construct the building at a cost of \$2,400,000.
- ■March 23, 2001: Construction began and Hazoor named the new mosque "Al Masjid Baetul Jaamay."
- February 27, 2004: The mosque was completed, and a full certificate of occupancy was received.
- ■April 25, 2004: A formal inauguration ceremony of Al Masjid Baetul Jamaay took place. The inauguration was presided over by Dr. Ihsanullah Zaffar Sahib, Ameer, Jama'at USA, and attended by members of the National Majlis-e-Amila, Presidents of all Jama'ats, dignitaries, members of Chicago and other Jama'ats.

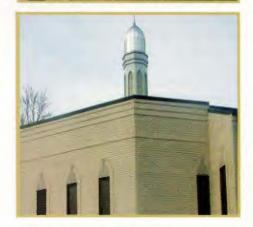
